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A local group of volunteers have won the coveted 2008 *Grand River Conservation Authority Watershed Award*. The recently founded Port Maitland, "On the Grand" History Association (PMHA) has taken one of this year's awards for the labour that over sixty volunteers and various companies have contributed to the cleanup of the Port Maitland Feeder Canal lock at Port Maitland. On the evening of October 30<sup>th</sup>, (I) Bill Warnick, President of this group journeyed to Cambridge to receive the 2008 award on behalf of the many volunteers who have given their time their talent and their resources to this project.

As I hopefully worm my way back into the hearts and minds of the staff and readers of The Chronicle, I am flattered that the Chronicle asked to write this article personally. Who else gets to present a totally unbiased report on their own activities?

The GRCA clearly put it hands into our community looking for groups who either formerly or informally take upon themselves to clean up the shoreline or waters within the source of the Grand River watershed. At least one couple who raise pigs and cattle choose to hold back runoff from their establishment by planting trees along the shore of streams running through their property. Fences were built to keep the animals from entering the creeks or streams.
